






Fishing Line Types - Feature & Benefits of Each

<u>Line Type</u>	<u>Features</u>	<u>Fishing Benefits</u>
Monofilament 	Floats Affordable Stretches Easy to Tie Knots	<i>Great for top water lures when being trolled such as bucktails, or leader material for dry fly fishing</i> <i>Good fishing line choice to change each season of fishing</i> <i>Absorbs shock of a fish hitting and reduces tearing hook out of mouth. Great Kokanee fishing line as they have soft mouths</i> <i>The line bites down on itself which makes it easy to apply basic fishing knots</i>
Flourocarbon 	Abrasion Resistant Sinks Reduced Stretch Reduced Visibilty	<i>Great choice for leader material for fish that attack the lures. Good for bottom fishing rocky areas, like drop shot or jig fishing</i> <i>Stays subsurface, good choice for trolling or soft plastic fishing when needing the bait to sink naturally</i> <i>Improve hook sets and provides the angler more ability to sense bites</i> <i>Great leader material for leader shy fish</i>
Braid 	No Stretch Thinner Diameter Abrasion Resistant No Memory	<i>Improve hook sets and provides the angler more ability to sense bites and bottom contact</i> <i>Smaller diameter of line can be used while still having higher level of breaking point; improves casting, allows more line to be added onto casting and spinning reels</i> <i>Great to use when fishing heavy covered area like bass fishing in weeds. Great for bottom bouncing</i> <i>Reduced line tangle and birdsnest on spools</i>
